It was fun working with them both in the morning when we worked with them on campus fixing, cleaning, and organizing things in the different buildings and in the afternoon doing VBS with them.

We are grateful for the mission groups that come to La Vida and for our La Vida staff who joined us in the outreach. They were a huge help & blessing to us. A lot of things were

accomplished during this summer school break because of their time and willingness to serve.



When we give up self and pray for what-

ever may best serve Him, then God will work in a way that we could have never imagined. It's a life changing experience, especially getting the chance to talk and help parents and kids on the reservation. Life at La Vida

People sometimes ask what it is like to live and work at La Vida Mission. We can't cover all the aspects in one short article, but here is a brief overview.

We live in a desert wilderness. We have a well that provides plenty of potable water, enough to give away 3.5 million (yes, MILLION) gallons to our community members, a very important aspect of our ministry here that brings our neighbors to our community pump and shows them God's love and care through our continued efforts to supply physical water as well as spiritual refreshment. The high salt and mineral content make it difficult to use for gardening/landscaping, so our landscaping plan is mostly Xeriscaping. We do have reverse osmosis for greenhouse and gardening, but it is high maintenance, so it isn't always working well.

Our summers are hot $(100^{\circ}+)$ and dry, except for the occasional thunderstorm that sends lots of water (flash flood) thundering down the wash, which becomes a river for a few days (Chaco River). Our winters can be severe -- down to 0 degrees, but very little snow, except for an occasional blizzard and then the snow is usually gone within a day, so no snow days for our students. Springtime is beautiful with wildflowers and flowering cacti.

Our school has about 24 K-12 students. Our High School students' class work includes vocational studies, such as gardening, welding, auto mechanics, cooking, outreach, etc., although some classes depend on available instructors.

The staff are working hard right now, getting ready for school. They are getting the grounds, buildings and dorms ready for the students that will arrive for the first day of school on August 15. There are three full-time teachers plus 3-5 more that are part-time. Most staff have multiple jobs and are involved with the school in some way. We have two staff members that are primarily Outreach but still do other jobs at the Mission and two other staff that regularly assist in the Outreach, 3-4 in maintenance (one of which is a water operator to help keep our water pure), 3-5 office staff, some of whom are part time, and two cooks. Our dorm parents usually have other part time jobs, often in the school or the office, and are vital to our success with the students. (If you wonder why sometimes when you call us, there is no one to answer the phone, it is because the office staff usually have a number of other duties.) Staff is always in short supply, we currently need a mechanic desperately, as well as a greenhouse manager.

Navajo News

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La Vida Mission, a supporting ministry of The Seventh-day Adventist Church, serves the Eastern Navajo Nation. It operates a K-12 Boarding school for Navajo children, clinic, water/mail/clothing services and an evangelism outreach for the Navajo community. The mission is located off Highway 371, 55 miles north of I-40, just south of mile post #56, or 50 miles south of Farmington, New Mexico.

The biggest outreach is the church plant/evangelism in Crownpoint and the outreach team goes there 2-3 days per week for visitation, Bible studies (Native New Day) and services. They also do health outreach, health fairs, etc. Most of our staff have had formal medical missionary training. Dr. Gardner and his wife come to volunteer at the clinic once a week to do physicals as well as health counseling and medical care. (see the article on page 4)

Hopefully, all staff are here on duty by August 1 with orientation on August 10-11 to get ready for the coming school year. We have a total of 24 staff (some of whom are part-time). Beginning stipend for full time staff is \$900 per month plus a furnished house and utilities (and meals when school is in session.)

Located on the eastern side of the Navajo Nation, La Vida Mission is an independent mission outpost in your backyard. We do not receive any support from the Conference, so our total funding comes from you, our partners and donors, and the occasional grant that comes our way. Our Navajo Nation brothers and sisters are sometimes in a forgotten area for Adventists because it is located within 3 Unions and 4 Conferences.

There are challenges and blessings but the greatest blessing is to work with our Lord to love and care for our neighbors and students while growing in our ability to trust and follow Him. We thank you for your prayers that open the floodgates of Heaven and pour out the strength, encouragement and resources we need to do His will!

Water Project Update

Donations continue to come in for this critical project. We still have a way to go but

we are blessed with each and every donation. Our total income = \$139,687, Paid expenses (1/2 of the water storage tank and geotechnical engineering) = \$58,674 leaving a subtotal on hand of \$81,013.

We still estimate that the total project will cost \$161,000 barring any major increases in costs. Thank you SO MUCH for donating to this project. All of the reports I mentioned last month, the engineering report, the site plan, boring records and laboratory test results have been forwarded for approval to New Mexico's Drinking Water Bureau.

As plans are approved, the engineers will move forward with the new foundation for the new tank. Again, I thank you for your donations and prayers. May God bless each of you!

When our nurse practitioner left La Vida Mission ten years ago, the "family practice" part of it closed, although it remained open as a Healthy Lifestyle Education Center for student health missionaries as well as extending its services to

the community through Health Fairs and Health Expos in the different chapter houses, senior centers, the local University Wellness Gym, and even for the Crownpoint Healthcare Facility employees primarily before the pandemic, in addition to 2 Health Expos outside our Crownpoint Church building last September 2022.

The Clinic was occasionally opened for Medical and Dental Services when nurse practitioner Mark Bramblett, son of a former La Vida missionary, and Dr. Doug Parks, a dentist and Board Member of La Vida, came to visit us.

This August, we are extremely delighted and truly grateful to God for sending Dr. Robert Gardner, Internal Medicine (who is also a member of the La Vida Mission Board) with his team and health assistants to La Vida Mission to offer a regular, once a week, free clinic



to the community including our own students and staff. Services to be offered include: Basic Physical Exam (Work, School/Sports), Ear Canal Exam (With TV), Skin Exam (for Moles, Etc.), Foot Exam Care, Toenails Trimmed, Basic Health Education (Handouts), Review of General Health (Discussions), Doppler Leg Circulation, Blood Pressure/Diabetes Review, Gastrointestinal Problem (Discussions), and Lifestyle Changes Help (Free Videos).

La Vida Mission has participated in the Fair before the Pandemic and this year's Fair was July 20-23, the first since the Pandemic lockdown. We set up a booth



with information about the Mission and School, and gave out books like "Walking with Jesus" written in English and Navajo, "The Great Controversy" and many booklets on Health and Healthy Living like "Coping with Stress", "Help with Depression", "American Indian Living", and many others.

While running the booth, we had the chance to be heard on air and introduce La Vida Mis-



sion and its ministry as some of our staff were interviewed by KCZY 107.3 FM Skyhawk Radio. Our booth was also visited by Ms. New Mexico who was very excited to receive a copy of the "Walking with Jesus" book.
